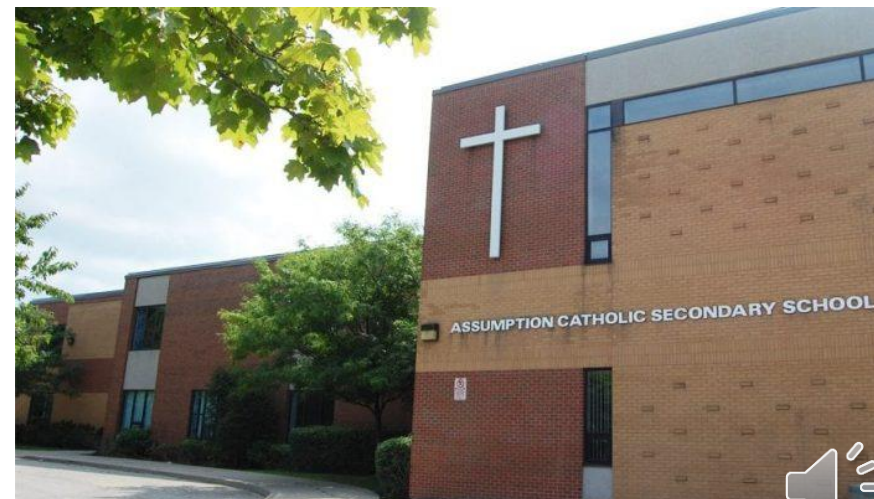

What do you need to graduate from high school?

18 compulsory credits

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

4	credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
3	credits in mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
2	credits in science
1	credit in Canadian history
1	credit in Canadian geography
1	credit in the arts
1	credit in health and physical education
1	credit in French as a second language
0.5	credit in career studies
0.5	credit in civics

In addition, students must complete:

- ✓ 12 optional credits†
- ✓ 40 hours of community involvement activities
- ✓ the provincial literacy requirement

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

Group 1:

- English or French as a second language**
- a Native language
- First Nations, Metis, and Inuit studies
- 1 • a classical or international language
- social sciences and the humanities
- Canadian and world studies
- guidance and career education
- cooperative education***

Group 2:

- health and physical education
- the arts
- 1 • business studies
- French as a second language**
- cooperative education***

Group 3:

- science (Grade 11 or 12)
- 1 • technological education
- French as a second language**
- computer studies
- cooperative education***

* A maximum of 3 credits in English as a second language (ESL) or English literacy development (ELD) may be counted towards the 4 compulsory credits in English, but the fourth must be a credit earned for a Grade 12 compulsory English course.

** In groups 1, 2 and 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a second language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 and one from either group 2 or group 3.

*** A maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits.

† The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits earned through approved dual credit courses.

Thinking about pathways

- Consider your success carefully when choosing a pathway
 - (ie. AP, academic, applied as well as strength of basic skills).
- How do you learn?
- Do your learning skills reflect the challenges you may face in the next grade at that level?
- Do you have the appropriate skill set in a subject area to continue at the same pathway level the following year?
- What is your commitment to the work that will be required?





What to consider when picking your courses?

- How many credits do you **have** and how many do you **need**?
- What **compulsory** courses do you need to take?
- What are your **future plans**?
- What elective courses do you **want** to take?
- What do you **want** to learn more about?
- What courses are needed for post-secondary programs that **interest you**?





Did you know

- Students taking a program that includes **both** academic and applied courses are still eligible to attend university?
- As long as students remain in the academic and then university stream with their **ENGLISH** courses, they will be eligible for many university programs.
 - This would include programs such as Social Sciences, Humanities, Arts and others (Note: this would not include Engineering, Health Sciences or other sciences)
- ALL university programs require **ENG4U**

- Religion (HRF3O, HRT3M)
- English (ENG3UA, ENG3U, ENG3C, ENG3E NBE3U1) **NBE3U1-First Nations, Metis,& Inuit Studies**
- Math (MCR3UA, MCR3U, MCF3M, MBF3C, MEL3E)
- 5 Electives

**** No spares are allowed in grade 11 ****



You will also be asked to select **2** alternative courses.

IMPORTANT

- These alternate course selections will be used in case one of your originally selected courses is not running or if there is a course conflict (ie. 2 courses in the same period, unable to be moved)
- Please choose these ***wisely***.
- The alternate will automatically be put in if either of the scenarios mentioned above happen.

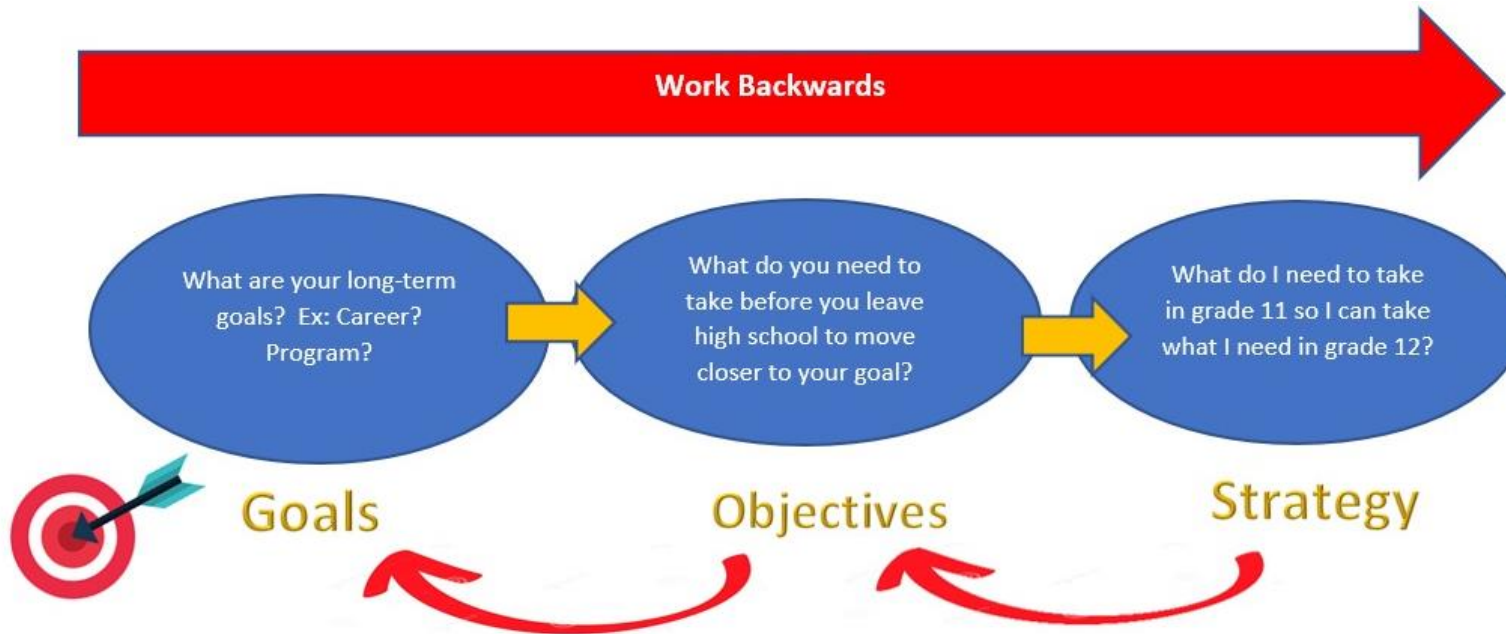
Check out course descriptors on [My Blueprint](#), or the course catalogue on www.gobluego.ca, or speak to the teachers of the course. Guidance can help direct you to the appropriate person.

- For Math, English, and Science ... You **must** have the pre-requisite.
ie. ENG2D to take ENG3U
- My Blueprint should indicate if you do not have the prerequisite.

Courses are scheduled based on the choices you make now.



Thinking ahead

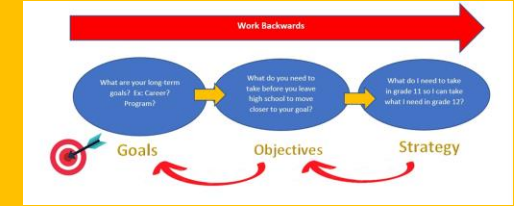


- Most grade 12 courses require a grade 11 pre-requisite, so you almost have to **work backwards**. What course is required in grade 11 so that I can take "X" course in grade 12?
- Ex: need AVI3M to take AVI4M
- [MyBluePrint](#) can help you here as well.

A closer look at College research ...

College Admission Guidelines:

- A completed high school diploma (OSSD)
- All Grade 11 and Grade 12 grades are sent to the Colleges (full disclosure)
- Specific grades and courses may be required
- Some programs are highly competitive (ex. Animation, nursing)
- Colleges also offer Applied Degrees which require 6 grade 12 Univ/Mixed level courses. Similar to the university requirement but often averages required are a bit lower

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Ontario Secondary School Diploma or *Mature Student Status*
- Grade 12 English (C, M or U)
- Grade 11 mathematics (C, M or U)

And one of the following sciences:

- Grade 11 or 12 biology
- Grade 11 or 12 chemistry
- Grade 11 physics (C, M or U)
- Grade 11 or 12 Exercise Science (C, M or U)

Please note: This program may be highly competitive and have a specific selection process and application deadline. For more information, please contact admissions@durhamcollege.ca or call 905.721.2300.

POST-ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Attend a compulsory information session in July that includes ordering the required uniform and firefighting equipment
- Criminal Background Check (CBC) (no convictions with Vulnerable Sector Screening. Community partners require students to have a clear police record check for all-site placements)
- Current Canadian Heart and Stroke Foundation Basic Rescuer Certificate in CPR (Healthcare Provider)
- Current standard first aid certificate
- Entry immunization form completed by a health-care provider

Please note: If you have been convicted of an offence under the criminal code for which you have not been pardoned, you may be unable to participate in all-site placements, a requirement for graduation.

University Admission Guidelines:

- High school diploma (OSSD)
- **ALL** Grade 11 and Grade 12 grades are sent to the Universities (*full disclosure*)
- Specific grades and courses will be required
- All programs require ENG4U plus 5 other grade 12 U/M courses
 - (Note: open courses like phys ed and coop are NOT included)
- Each university can be different even with the same program

Something to think about

Many students take summer school...



- Some students take summer school for reach ahead opportunities.

Ex. Some students take Religion **HRT3M**.

This allows students to take an extra elective in their grade 11 year.



- Some students take summer school because they were not successful at a course during the regular school year.

This allows students to make up the credit so that they do not fall behind.

How do you sign up for summer school?

- Sign up will be through [MyBluePrint](#) and will happen in May and June 2021

What else do you need to know about summer school?

- It is **YOUR** responsibility to let us know that you are registered for Summer School so that we can adjust your schedule.

Community Service Hours

Students are encouraged to complete their Community Service hours.



The Ministry requires that 40 hours are completed before graduation.

Make sure the activity meets the eligibility standards (stated on the back of the form).

Electives and Descriptors:



- **AWQ3M (Photography)** –AVI101 or AVI201 are pre-requisites
- **AWQ301(Photography)**- No pre-requisite
- **PAF30W (Weight-Lifting)** , **PAL30V (Volleyball)**
PAI3OR (Rec & Leisure) are all **co-ed**
- **PPL30M** – males only, **PPL30F** – females only



Social Science courses:

- **CHA3U** – American history
- **CHW3M** – World history (earliest times to 16th century)
- **CGF3M** – Physical Geography (Forces of Nature)
- **CLU3M** – Law
- **HSP3C** – Introduction to Anthropology, Psychology and Sociology (College prep)
- **HSP3U** – Introduction to Anthropology, Psychology and Sociology (University prep)
- **HPC3O** – Parenting, raising health children (nurturing and meeting developmental needs of children), Open



Business Electives:

- **BAF3M** – Accounting (ie. focus on financial aspect of business)
- **BMI3C** – Marketing (ie. advertising, trends, consumer buying habits, etc)
- **BDI3C** – Entrepreneurship (ie. How to plan a successful business)
- **CIE3M** – Economics (challenges facing the Canadian economy - explore the economic role of business, labour, and government, as well as consumers).

Did You Know?

..... that if you take **5** or more Business courses at Assumption (gr 9 – 12), you can earn a Business Certificate



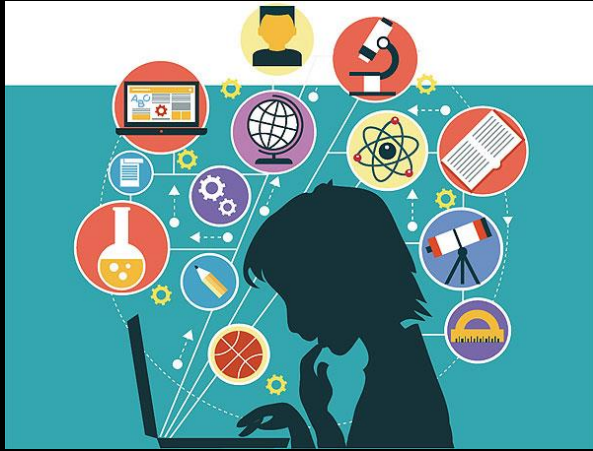

Tech Descriptors:



- **TCJ3C1** – Woodshop
- **TDJ3M1** – Technical Design (awareness of environmental, human, financial & material issues affect tech design)
- **TGJ3M1** – Communication Technology (media perspective – tv/video, movie/radio production etc.)
- **TEJ3M1** – Computer Technology – (ie. computer systems, networks, electronics, robotics, etc.)
- **TFJ3C1** – Hospitality & Tourism (ie. Foods)
- **TGG3MY** - Yearbook
- **TXJ3E1** – Cosmetology from a salon/spa perspective (ex. hair, nails, makeup)
- **ICS3U1** – Computer Science (programming and software)





Science Electives

Biology – SBI3UA, SBI3U, SBI3C**

Chemistry – SCH3UA, SCH3U

Gr 12 SPH4C – College Physics (there is no grade 11 College Physics – pre-requisite is SNC2P)

Gr 12 SCH4C – College Chemistry (there is no grade 11 College Chemistry – pre-requisite is SNC2P)

** There is no grade 12 College Biology



Co-operative Education (Co-op)

NGC30/NGC40

This is a 2-credit course and runs a half day either the entire morning or the entire afternoon. Choose this carefully because it cannot be changed. It would require 2 different courses to replace co-op. Please contact our Co-op teachers Mr. Boin and Mr. Haley for specific questions about co-op and job placements.

- Some students wish to take a grade 12 course in grade 11 to decrease the pressure/course load for grade 12.
 - This is possible as long as you have the pre-requisite to that grade 12 course.
- Some gr 12 courses that do not have pre-requisites (other than gr 11 English) are:



Social Sciences and Co-op

Options:*

- **CGU4M1** – World Geography: Urban Patterns & Population Issues
- **CGW4UA – AP** World Issues: A Geographic Analysis (looks at global challenge of creating a more sustainable & equitable world)
- **CLN4U** – LAW (gr 11 Law is not a pre-requisite)
- **HHS4U** – Families in Canada (analyze the development of individuals, intimate relationships, family and parent-child relationships)
- **HSB4U** - Challenge and Change in Society (analyze how/why cultural, social, and behavioural patterns change over time)
- **NGC30/NGC40** – Co-op. This is a **2** credit course and runs a half day either the entire morning or the entire afternoon. ** Choose this carefully because it cannot be changed. It would require 2 different courses to replace co-op.



Business Studies:

- **BBB4M** – International Business (the importance of trade in the global economy)
- **BOH4M** – Business Leadership (focus on organizations, business ethics, managing a diverse workforce, leadership techniques, etc.)
- **BDV4C** – Entrepreneurship (How to develop a business plan and start a business)
- **CIA4U** – Economics (analyze current economic issues, use of resources, supply/demand, etc.)



Interdisciplinary Courses:

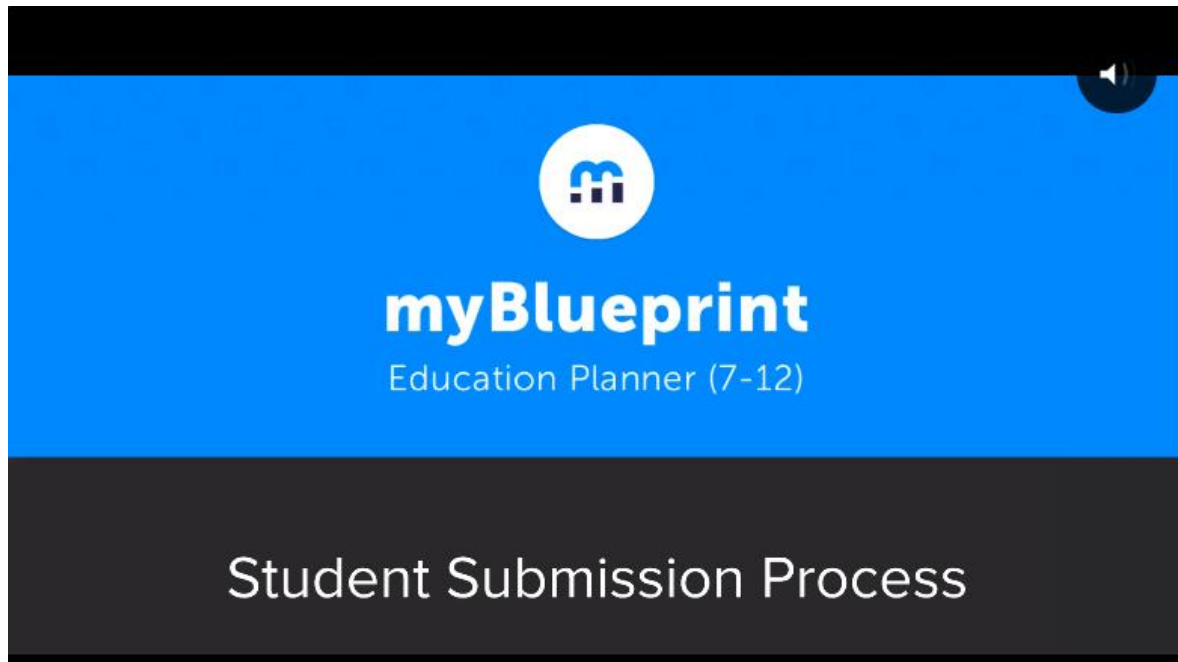
- **IDC4UB** – Finance (learn how to manage your own finances, create budgets, develop long-term financial plan, making responsible choices about income and expenses, etc)
- **IDC4UP** – Phys Ed Leadership (explores human relations, communication, and barriers; and personality\leadership styles that affect individuals in educational (focus on physical education), and social settings

Important Note: We offer both IDC4UP (Phys. Ed Leadership) and IDC4UB (Finance). Both will be considered as a credit towards graduation HOWEVER, only **ONE** IDC4U will count towards university requirements of 6 U/M level courses.



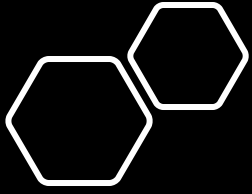
