Urban Farming on a Grand Scale

Imagine a city that grows most of its food on its very own rooftops, where tomatoes ripen on the vine year-round—even in the dead of winter. That's the idea behind <u>Lufa Farms</u>, which operates four rooftop greenhouses in and around Montreal and delivers more than 25,000 fresh-picked vegetable baskets to its customers every week. Founded in 2009 by Mohamed Hage and Lauren Rathmell, Lufa sprouted from the idea that urban farming could grow crops where people live, without using any new land, and deliver food without the carbon footprint of long-distance transportation. (In Canada, 92 per cent of imported produce travels more than 1,500 kilometres.) "When you buy a tomato in the winter, you're probably getting one that's been trucked in from California or Mexico," says Rathmell. "We deliver ours right to you the day after they're picked."

Hydroponic technology helps Lufa's greenhouses operate sustainably, recycling about 90 per cent of the water used by the plants. In lieu of pesticides, ladybugs and parasitic wasps devour aphids and other pests. Using residual heat from the buildings below, each farm requires half the energy of greenhouses on the ground. Meanwhile, the company's programmers keep operations nimble with greenhouse automation. Software manages delivery logistics while allowing customers to tailor their own baskets, choosing from 50 varieties of fruits and vegetables, plus other items, like bread and cheese from local producers. Lufa Farms is one of many similar urban-farming projects around the world, with commercial greenhouses and gardens springing up in places like London, Paris and New York. Analysts predict city-grown crops could eventually make up 10 per cent of the global food supply. —By Anna-



What the Annunciation Taught Me About Maintaining Joy Amidst Uncertainty

Easter Reflection:

John 20.19-31 (2nd week of Easter)

"When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors were locked where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin, one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

"I can be a Christian without going to church!" I've heard it many times from teens and adults. And I've always disagreed. Why? Because of Thomas.

Thomas was gone when Jesus appeared to the Apostles. Then he had trouble believing when the Apostles told him about it. He only believed when he saw Jesus for himself.

The message? We need Christian community to really believe in the Resurrection. It's the community that gives us strength, challenge, and guidance to act as we believe. Notice that Jesus gave the Apostles peace and a mission while they were gathered. The same is true today. It is in Christian community--worship, service trips, youth groups, religion classes, retreats--that we most fully find Christ's peace, remember our mission, and receive strength to act as we believe. If we never worship, never talk about our faith, or never serve with other Catholics or others who belong to the same faith community, pretty soon we'll find it harder to believe. And our actions might not show that we believe in a Saviour who calls us to live differently from how the world tells us to live. We live differently because our Saviour conquered death. Love has won!

If a word or phrase from the Gospel grabs your heart, sit quietly for several minutes and repeat it to yourself, and ask God to show you how it applies to your life. Or, reflect and possibly journal on the following question:

What type of Catholic/Christian gathering (Mass? youth group? retreat? service trip?)
 helps me the most to connect with my faith community? Why?
