Thank you for another great week! As we look towards next week we wanted to share a few reminders and updates with you.

Daily Self-Screening:

Parents and guardians are reminded to monitor for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 in your children and to complete the <u>COVID-19 Self-Assessment Tool for Schools</u> each morning before sending your children to school.

Textbook Return:

If you have not already returned your quad one textbooks or other resources please do so when you are next in the building according to your cohort. There is a table outside of the main office for you to leave your textbook/materials. Please ensure you label it with your name and your teacher's name.

If you are in cohort C, please put your labelled textbook in the bin just inside the front doors. If you have anything to pick up (photos, student card, etc.) please call the main office (905-847-0595) and someone will bring it out to you. **DO NOT ENTER THE SCHOOL.**

Quad 2 Schedule & Student Handbook

The <u>quad 2 daily schedule</u> has been posted on our Loyola website. Please pay close attention to the revised Wednesday pattern. The first day of quad 2 is Monday November 16, 2020. Please know that when you look at your child's timetable on SIS you will see periods 3 and 4 starting at different times than our daily schedule. We are following the same times as in quadmester 1 - morning classes begin at 8:20 am. Please use the <u>daily schedule</u> on the website for specific times and days for cohorts and class periods.

Entry & Exit Doors:

Students are reminded to review their <u>entry and exit doors based</u> on their classrooms. These doors may have changed from quad 1 doors as they are based on class location.

Quad 2 Cohorts:

All students have been cohorted for quad two. Cohorts continue to be:

There are approximately 20 students that needed to be moved to the non-alpha cohort to adhere to Public Health guidelines regarding class sizes. These families have been

contacted. If you haven't been contacted by the main office you are in your alphabetical cohort. You can also see your cohort listed in \underline{SIS} .

Switching Cohorts:

Students can switch to cohort C (entirely online) at any time. To make the switch, a parent/guardian, unless the student is 18+, needs to contact the appropriate Vice Principal. The switch is not official until you have received a confirmation email from the Vice Principal.

Students wishing to switch from cohort C to cohort A or B, will need to wait until the end of the ten week quadmester.

Quadmester 1 Report Cards:

In light of the current health and safety protocols and our ongoing efforts to reduce the handling of paper due to COVID-19, Quadmester 1 report cards will be delivered electronically. The report cards will be delivered directly to parents and guardians by email on Friday, November 20.

Accessing the Electronic Report Card:

As an added measure of security to protect your child's privacy, you will need your child's Ontario Education Number (OEN) in order to access the report card. You can find your child's OEN number on a previous report card – it is a 9-digit number (e.g. xxx-xxx-xxx).

Attendance:

Parents are responsible for contacting the school when their child is absent or late. There are three ways to do this outlined on our <u>school website</u>. Safe arrival calls go home at 9:30 AM and 5:00 PM daily. These calls provide parents with the opportunity to validate the absences. If this process is not followed a subsequent email is sent the following day to connect with your child's Vice Principal. If we do not hear back from you, the absence will remain as a truancy. Please ensure that you are following the attendance process so that we can work collaboratively to ensure your child is safe and our attendance records are accurate.

If a student is not present when attendance is taken and/or when a teacher makes attempts during the course of the class to connect with them (verbally or through the chat) and they are non-responsive, they will be marked absent. Students are expected to be present and participating during virtual class time.

OUAC has processed Loyola's marks for our graduating grade 12s. PIN numbers that are required to begin an application, should be mailed out within the next 2 weeks from OUAC. Loyola will not receive the letters with the PIN numbers, instead it will be mailed directly to the student. Due to an increase volume of mailouts and covid circumstances, letters may take some time to arrive. We ask for your patience. University applications are not due until January 15th, 2021. It is strongly recommended students review the 'How-To' videos on www.ouac.on.ca before starting their application and reviewing the information posted on the D2L Student Services page.

College Applications:

If you missed our presentation on 'How to Apply to College', students can review important information on the D2L Student Services page under 'Content'. Here, you will find a step-by-step instruction page, videos, and a presentation on how to apply. To apply to college, you do not need a "PIN" number to start your applications, only your OEN and student number. Applications are now open. Students can start their application anytime. It is strongly recommended to complete an application before Feb. 1st, 2021 for 'Equal Consideration'. Please visit <u>www.ontariocolleges.ca</u> for more information.

Community Service Hours:

Many virtual community service opportunities have been posted on the D2L's Student Services page as well as the Virtual Chapel page. Just a reminder, if you are completing community service hours outside of Loyola, you must complete a <u>Pre-approval Form</u> BEFORE you start your hours to make sure the activity is an acceptable placement.
