Principal Report	 Kathleen Moro Review of Bylaws – Gerry: due to lack of quorum at last year's meetings, the most recent version of the Bylaws was reviewed, he explained that the Bylaws can be amended going forward, Luis Lucca asked how much of the Bylaws were taken from «above», Gerry explained it is by and large driven by Ministry and Board policy. Luis requested more time to go through the Bylaws. Kylie suggested we not put a limit on the number of active members as has been done at other Board sites. Discussion of «shall include» changing to «may include but not be limited to» page 5. This year we have 12 parent members; we would need 7 members physically present for quorum. Emmanuel questioned how voting is done: by majority? Gerry confirmed a simple majority among voting members (parents) is necessary. We will wait until the next meeting to vote on the Bylaws, so all members have a chance to read and understand. The Gift of Giving Back – a charitable organization run through Oakville Rangers Hockey, Kathleen explained how we participated last year to donate food alongside the hockey association and provide storage in one of our gyms. At the school level, Social Justice Club, the Sports Leadership SHSM, Construction SHSM, first period classes were all involved in giving back to the community. SGF Suggestions – Kathleen explained how School Generated Funds are distributed, that we are at 68% of community donations for School Activity Fee, other schools are at 88%. Discussion around increasing donations to the school (gift cards, student access, Tip Tap, accepting cash - tricky). Kathleen will speak with Rocco regarding strategy to increase School Activity Fee participation. Kathleen explained that a school BBQ (of which there were two last year) costs \$7000 each. We needed to purchase 32 football helmets at a cost of \$12000, a large donation from last year's graduating student offset that cost. We don't do much fundraising at the secondary level because of the School Activity Fee. Civvies

ACHIEVING	 IB Programme Evaluation Update & IB SGF – Antonia Montanari: Audit year for IB, Part 1: preliminary review due March 2024 to demonstrate we are following programs standards and practices, Part 2: Self Study - all stakeholders participate in committees, site visit. The program is evaluated every 5 years. IB SGF at 100% paid, used to fund Turnitin.com to vet for plagiarism, IB graduation, gr. 11 and 12 exam registrations, Common Compass mental health workshops, IB staff training, annual IB fee, yearly database subscriptions. Gerry: does Turnitin.com catch ChatGPT? Answer: no, but the IB office has been training teachers and providing strategies to work with AI. OSSLT Update – Melissa Giardina: waiting for last year's results, fall tests will be written between Nov. 1 & 30 for gr. 10s taking English this semester, those taking English in semester 2 will write in semester 2.
